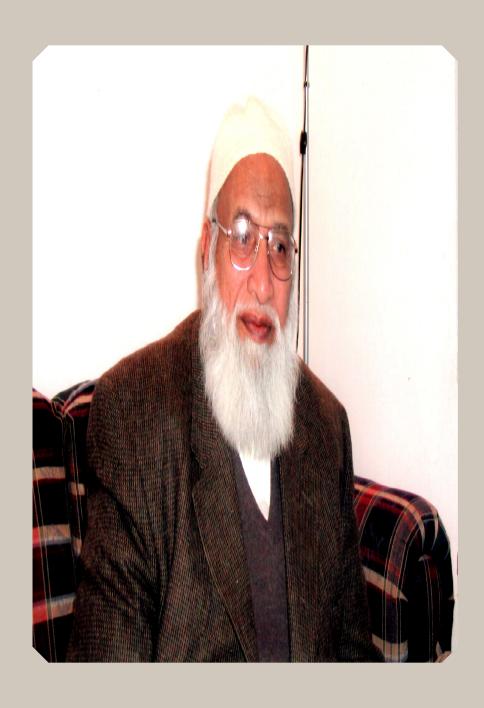

Prof. Rana Asghar Ali Khan was from a small city of Pakistan, named Burewala. He started his career as a clerk in the Govt. College Burewala. He continued his education to become a librarian, a lecturer, and retired as a professor from the same institute.

With great passion and love to help others, he constantly worked hard to facilitate the education and healthcare of disadvantaged and low socio-economic households, even when he himself was in a struggling phase. He always believed that the passion and desire to help others is the most valuable thing, and everyone should put their part whether they belong to a wealthy or a modest class.

"Once he came across a crying sweeper and was very moved to learn that sweeper has no money to offer tea to the guests coming for his daughter's wedding. He offered his only valuable possession (a bicycle) at that particular time to him for sale to get some money. He himself was living in a modest rented house raising his five kids on mere income at that time."

He was able to make positive impact on others' lives in many ways even when he had no financial means himself, even the he collected used books for the underprivileged college students. While he always dreamt of building a state-of the art educational facility one day, life did not give him the chance. In his view, quality education was the only way to provide underprivileged people of our society a chance to get out of vicious cycle of poverty. Scholorship / Qarz-E-Hasna Scheme

One of the leading projects of Rouha Welfare Trust under the umbrella of Rouha Educational Society is providing Scholarships that are given to the intelligent but deserving students of Burewala pursuing higher studies.



Basically, this scheme is a Qarz-e-Hasna (Interest-Free Loan) scheme which was started in 2006 for those students who did not accept aid.

The amount is released on monthly basis. The students have to return back the loan once they get a job after the successful completion of their studies.

This scheme facilitates the students to carry on with their education without being a burden on household.

Currently around 30 students are getting Monthly Scholarships @ Rs. 5,000/- each.

Aid to Boarding School Children

Zaawiya Trust School, Lahore a non profit school aims to provide an authentic educational system for the underprevillaged students.

21 Annual Ceremonies have been conducted to date.







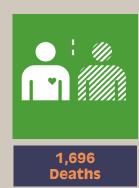

Story of Umar Daraz

Umar Daraz was from Habib Colony, the outskirts of Burewala city. He was a barber by profession. Having three kids studying in govt. schools, life was not easy for Umar. In 2013, he was diagnosed with chronic kidney disease. On his treatment, he was advised for a kidney transplant, his wife stood up for this and donated her kidney.

Life seemed to be coming back on track but then in 2016, he faced kidney failure once again. He was on complete bed rest. All of his savings were used on frequent kidney dialysis. Even his brother sold his business (barber shop) and began to work as employee on the same shop. At that time, this news came to Rouha Welfare Trust, our team visited his house, issued monthly food supplies to support this family during this difficult time and offered free treatment from Bashir Begum Hospital.

But his condition got worse day by day and he got admitted to Sheikh Zayed Hospital, Lahore. Unfortunately, he could not survive and left this world. Inna lillahi wa inna ilaihi rajioon.

Umar is gone but Rouha Welfare Trust did not leave his family and kids alone. We still support his family with monthly food supplies.

For Anwar, it was really a big challenge to continue his studies after he scored 88% in intermediate back in 2016, as his father was just a fruit seller of Burewala and his mother was a house worker. Having seven siblings, all studying in government schools, it was a difficult task for Anwar to continue his studies. This news came to RWT and he became a part of our Qarz-e-Hasna Program.

Especially, it was the support from his parents and from Rouha Welfare Trust that this intelligent student got admission in UET: one of the best engineering institutes of Pakistan. With his dedication, he became chemical engineer in



2020, and we are proud of him. Currently, he is serving as chemical engineer at a better organization and trying to repay the loan so we can help some other deserving student.

Auditors' Report

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of **Rouha Welfare Trust**, *Bashir Begum Memorial Welfare Hospital*, *Chak No.259/EB*. *Lahore Road*, *Tehsil Burewala*, *District Vehari*, which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2022, and the statement of income and expenditure, statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, (or give a true and fair view of) the financial position of **Rouha Welfare Trust**, *Bashir Begum Memorial Welfare Hospital*, *Chak No.259/EB. Lahore Road*, *Tehsil Burewala*, *District Vehari* and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the approved accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as applicable in Pakistan. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Rouha Welfare Trust, Bashir Begum Memorial Welfare Hospital, Chak No.259/EB. Lahore Road, Tehsil Burewala, District Vehari in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (The code), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management

The management committee is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the approved accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan, and for such internal control as the management committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management committee is responsible for assessing the society's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the society or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the society's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs as applicable in Pakistan will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or

in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs as applicable in Pakistan, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to
 fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit
 evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not
 detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error,
 as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override
 of internal control.

Notes to the Financial Statements
For the year ended June 30, 2022

1. Legal status and operations

Rouha Welfare Trust was registered on September 02, 2021 under the under the Societies Registration Act, XXI of 1860. The organization is a non for profit, non-governmental and non-political developmental organization which was established in 2003, struggling to aware, organize and help marginalized people in realizing their developmental, civil and other basic human rights. The registered office of the organization is situated at Bashir Begum Memorial Welfare Hospital, Chak No.259/EB. Lahore Road, Tehsil Burewala, District Vehari.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan. The accounting and reporting standards applicable in Pakistan comprise of:

- Revised Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards for Small Sized Entities (AFRS for SSE)
 issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (ICAP); and
- Accounting Standards for Not for Profit Organizations (Accounting Standard for NPOs) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (ICAP).

3. Significant accounting policies

3.1 Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except as otherwise stated in the respective policies and notes given hereunder.

3.2 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any identified impairment loss except freehold land and capital work-in-progress, which are stated at cost. Cost of operating fixed assets consists of historical cost and attributable expenses in bringing the assets to their working condition. Depreciation on all assets except freehold land and capital work-in-progress is taken to income and expenditure account applying reducing balance method at the rates specified in the note 4.1. Depreciation is charged for the full year in which an asset is purchased while no depreciation is charged in the year of disposal.

Gain or loss on the disposal of operating fixed assets represented by the difference between the proceeds and the carrying amounts of the assets is recognized as income or expense during the period. Normal repairs and maintenance are taken to income and expenditure account as and when incurred. Major improvements and modifications are capitalized and the assets replaced, if any, other than those kept as stand-by, are retired.

3.3 Revenue

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable on the following basis:

- All donations, fee grants and other income are recognized when realized.
- Interest/mark-up is accounted for on accrual basis.

Accrued and other liabilities

All liabilities are initially measured at cost, which is the fair value of the consideration given. A liability is derecognized when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expired.

Deferred grant

Grant received for the purchase of property and equipment and intangible assets is recognized as "deferred grant for property and equipment and intangible assets" and is amortized over the useful life of the asset. Whereas other grant received from the donor are recognized as "deferred operational grant" and is transferred to the income and expenditure account to the extent of the expenses incurred by the Organization, in accordance with the terms of grant.

3.6 Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents include cash-in-hand, cheques-inhand and deposits with banks.

Foreign currency transaction

Currency transactions are recorded at the rate prevailing on the date of transactions and foreign currency deposits are translated into Pak Rupees at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date.
