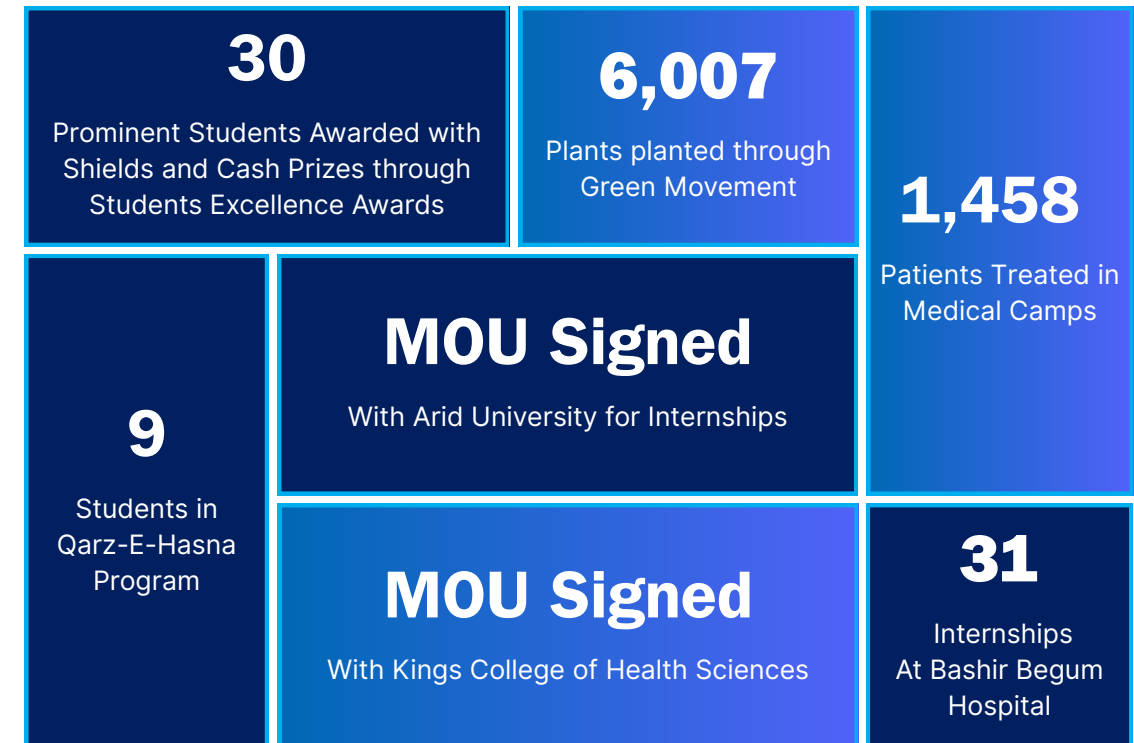
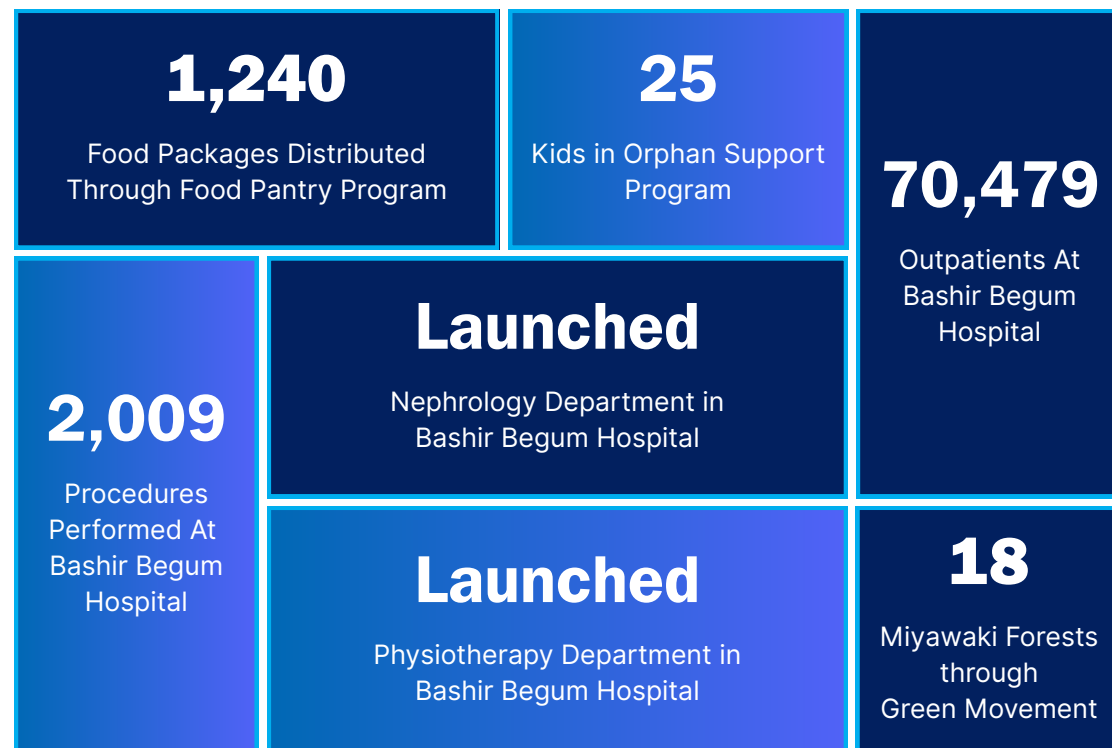

PROF. RANA ASGHAR ALI KHAN

Professor Rana Asghar Ali Khan hailed from the modest town of Burewala in Pakistan, where he embarked on his professional journey as a clerk at Govt. College, Burewala. Over the years, his unwavering commitment to education and his passion for serving the less fortunate led him to rise through the ranks, ultimately retiring as a professor at the very institution where his career began.

Driven by an immense desire to make a difference in the lives of those less privileged, Professor Rana Asghar Ali Khan tirelessly worked towards improving education and healthcare access for disadvantaged individuals, even during times when he faced hardships. He firmly believed that the willingness to help others was the most precious asset one could possess, transcending social and economic boundaries.

One poignant anecdote underscores his selflessness: encountering a distraught sweeper unable to afford tea for guests at his daughter's wedding, Professor Khan empathetically offered his prized possession, a bicycle, for sale to provide financial relief. During that period, he resided in a modest rented house, supporting his own family of five on a meager income.

Despite his own financial limitations, Professor Khan made a significant impact on the lives of others, notably by collecting used books for underprivileged college students. While he aspired to construct a state-of-the-art educational facility, life never granted him that opportunity.

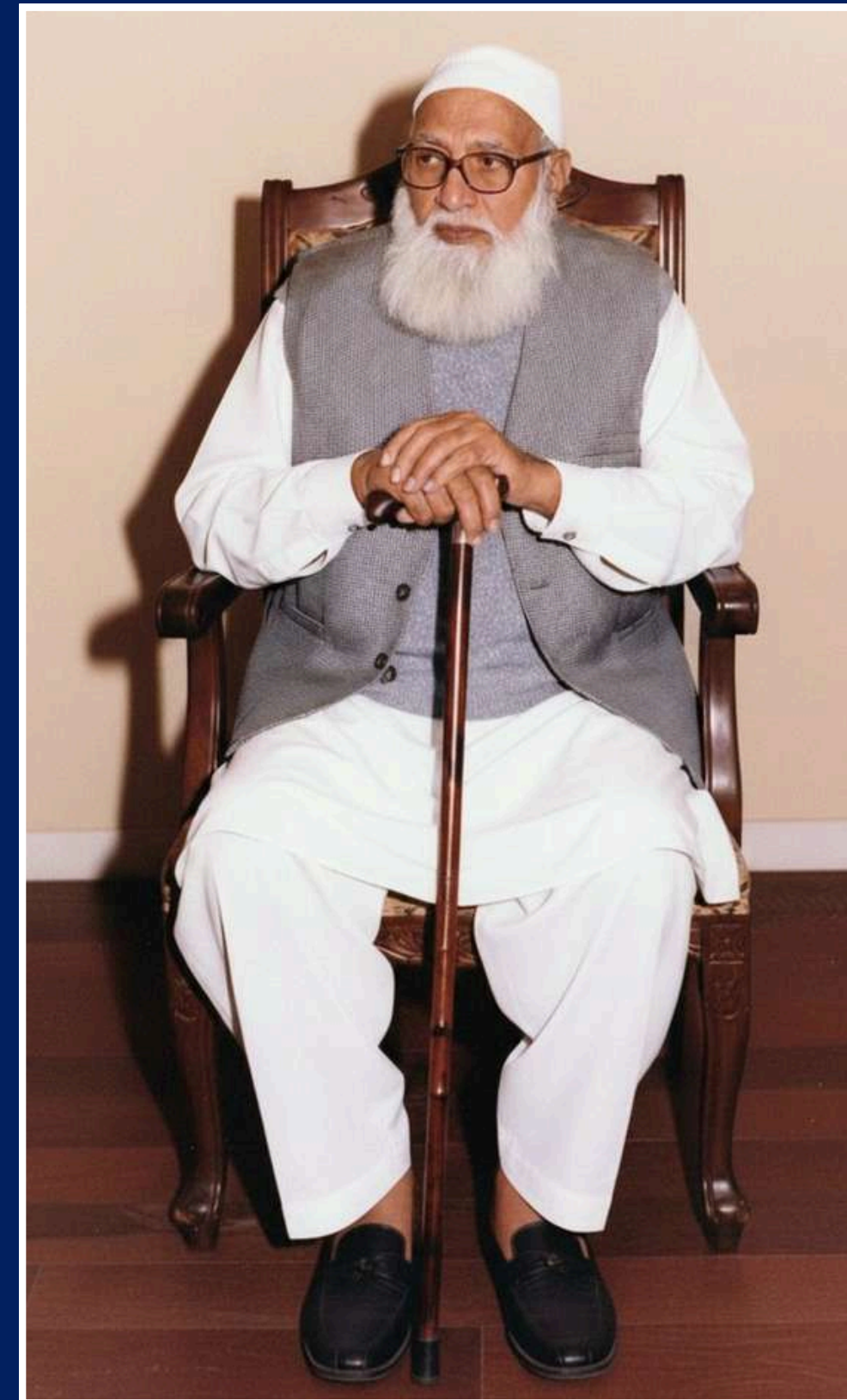
He firmly believed that quality education was the key to breaking the cycle of poverty for the underprivileged in society. We pledge to honor his legacy and fulfill his dream by constructing.

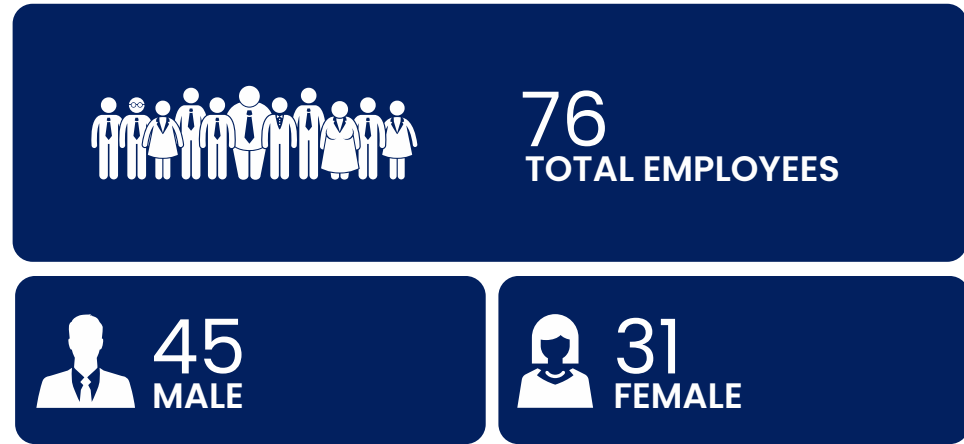

FOOD PANTRY PROGRAM

Food Pantry Program, a collaborative effort between Rouha Welfare Trust and Zafar Mir Foundation, was launched as a response to the growing food insecurity in Burewala and the surrounding areas. It aimed to provide monthly food supplies to the most vulnerable and deserving families ensuring that they have access to nutritious food items on a regular basis.

Commencing in September 2021 with an initial outreach to 45 families, this program has steadily extended its scope. As of June 2025, it consistently caters to the needs of 105 deserving families, (406 individuals) on a monthly basis.

This food package is designed to meet the best dietary needs of a family for a whole month. The package includes essential items such as rice, lentils, pulses, cooking oil, flour, sugar, and other spices, etc.

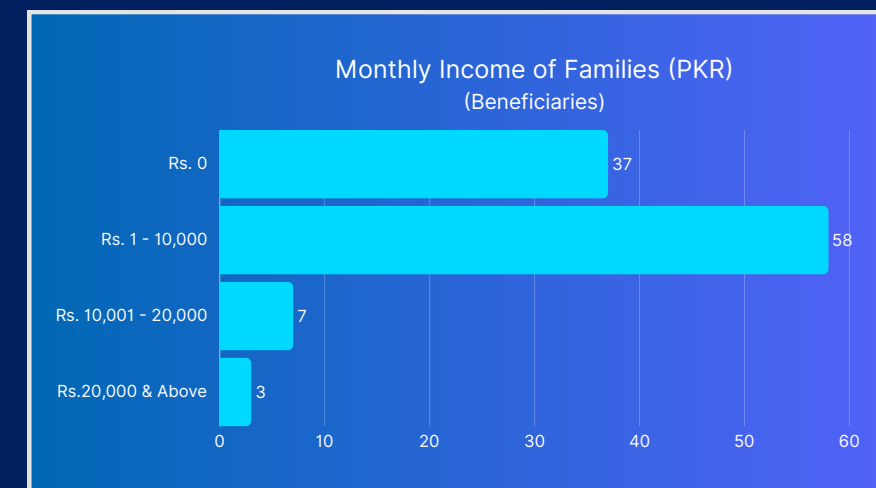
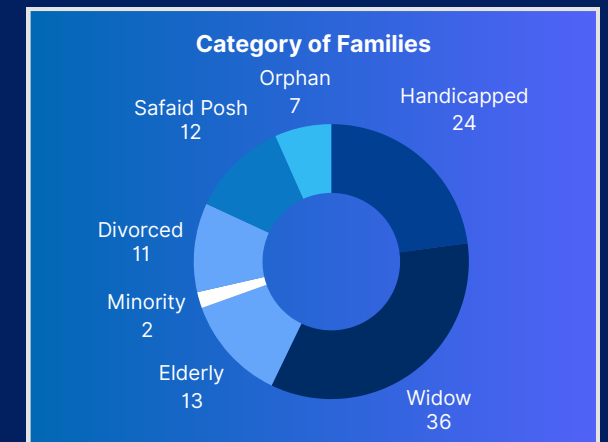
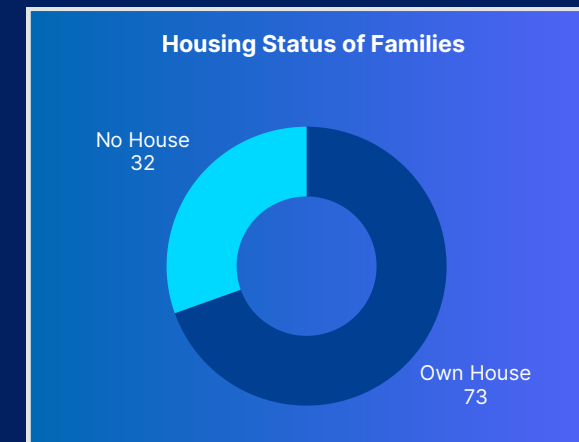
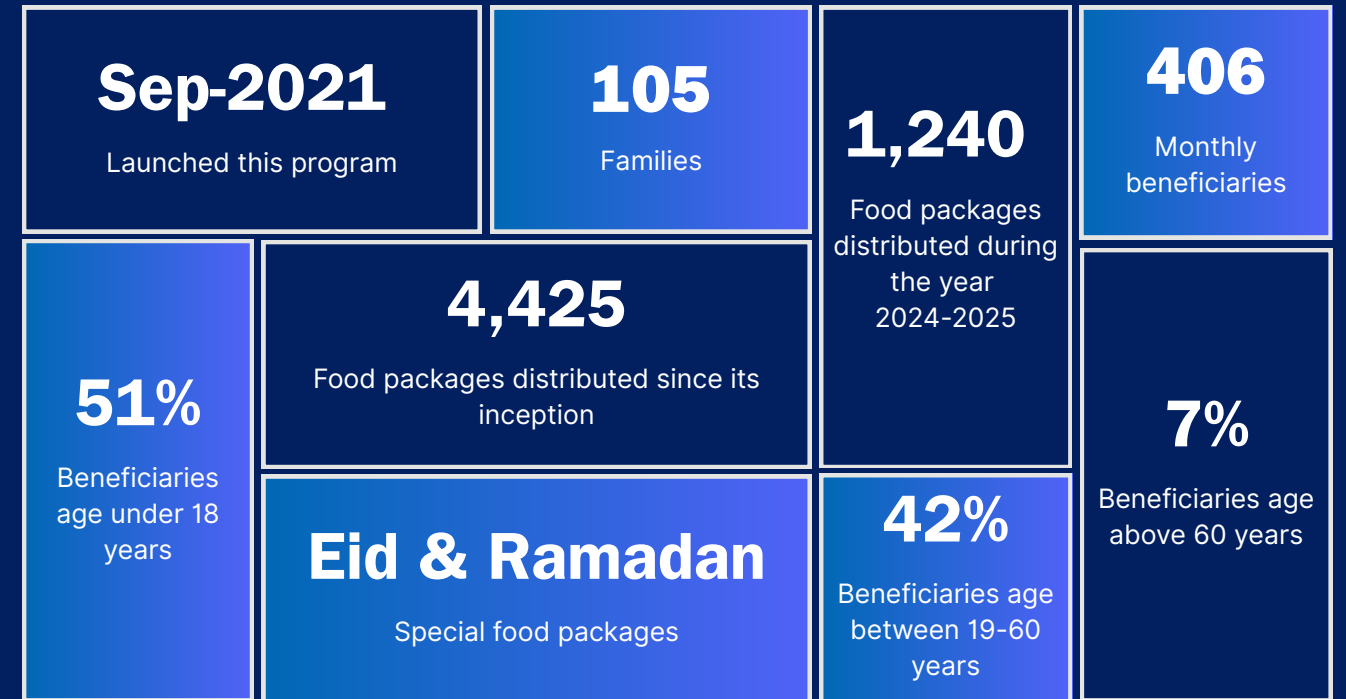
This program has successfully contributed to improving the nutritional intake of the families. Families now have access to a more balanced diet, reducing the risk of malnutrition. The program has fostered a sense of community and solidarity among beneficiaries. Recipients often share their experiences and have the spirit to support others. There have been noticeable improvements in the health and well-being of beneficiaries. By this effort, we are trying to reduce the poverty level.

We aim to expand the program to reach more deserving families in the coming months by expanding the program's coverage area.

Health Screenings

Rouha Welfare Trust organize health screening for children, including eye examinations, pediatric check-ups, and general medical consultations. The initiative focused on ensuring children's well-being through early detection of health issues, particularly vision-related concerns. This effort reflects the Trust's commitment to promoting healthy growth and providing timely medical support to children under its care.

Through mentorship and guidance, the initiative helped strengthen confidence, awareness, and active family involvement in the children's overall development.



Monthly Meetings

Regular meetings are held with the mentors to discuss the progress and well-being of children. These meetings provide a platform to review each child's educational performance, emotional development, and personal needs. Mentors share observations and feedback, while the Trust team evaluates how to enhance support and address any challenges. Through this collaborative approach, both mentors and the Trust work together to ensure that every child receives the guidance, care, and opportunities necessary for a stable and promising future.

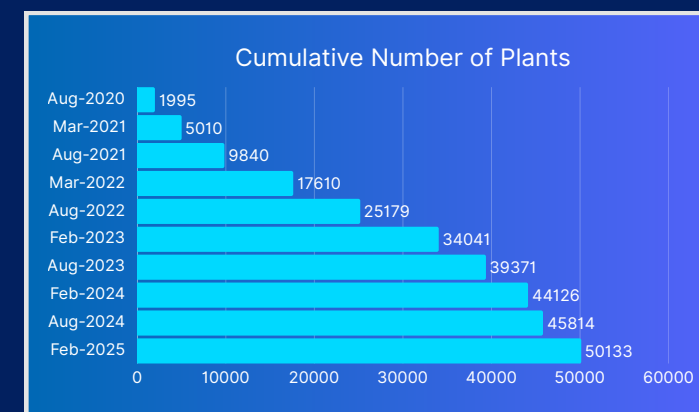
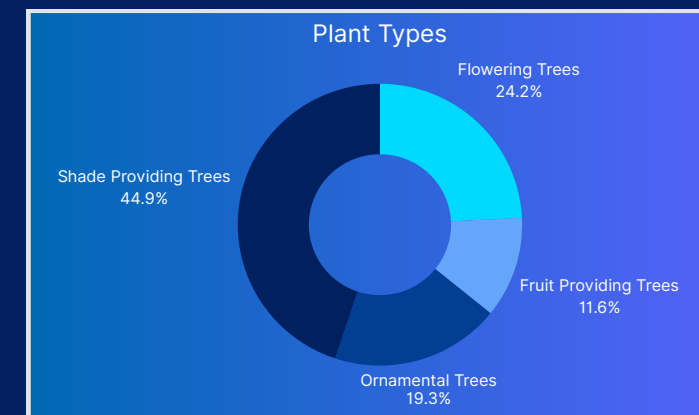
This plantation program goes beyond tree planting it cultivates environmental responsibility and sustainability in future generations. We remain dedicated to our mission, striving to expand our positive impact and contribute to a greener, more sustainable world.

MIYAWAKI FORESTS:

The adoption of the Miyawaki Forest concept marks a significant step toward advancing environmental sustainability.

The Miyawaki Forest Method, developed by Japanese botanist Akira Miyawaki, is an innovative technique for rapid forest creation. It involves densely planting diverse native species close together, which accelerates natural growth and fosters resilient, self-sustaining ecosystems. Renowned for enhancing biodiversity and combating climate change, the Miyawaki approach has become a globally recognized model for effective environmental restoration.

The remarkable 98% survival rate achieved within six months highlights the effectiveness of this concept. To ensure long-term sustainability, we conduct regular monitoring of plant growth and actively encourage schools to continue planting and nurturing these trees.

PROF. RANA ASGHAR ALI KHAN HUMANITARIAN AWARD

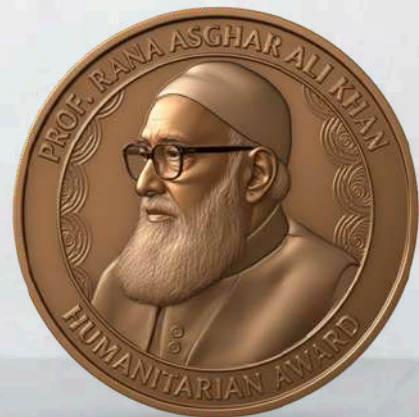

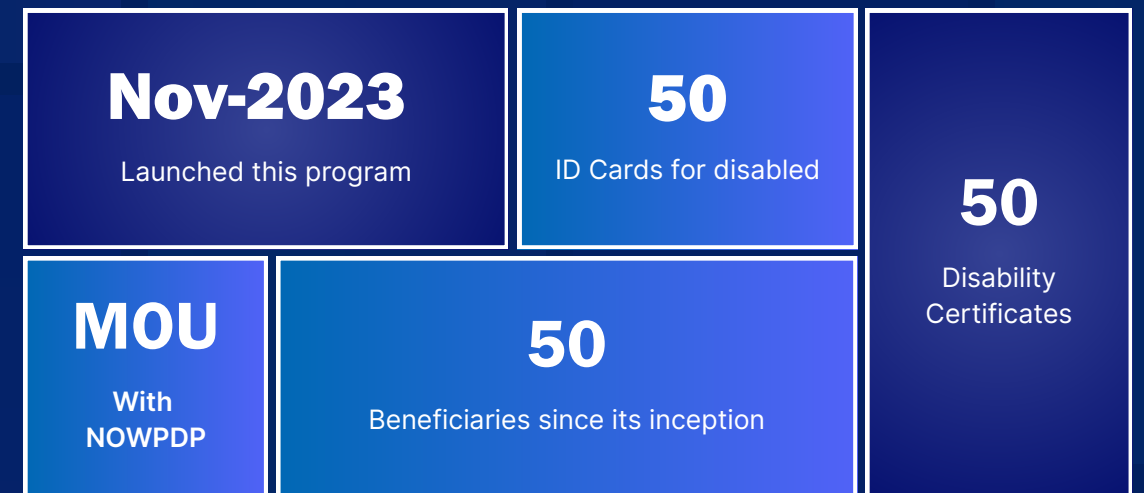

Program focuses on installing hand facilities with ease and The installation of commodes, handrails, and ramps in government schools, colleges, and hospitals has significantly enhanced the quality of life for the persons with disabilities. These persons of our community can have easy access to such places without being a burden on others

Rouha Welfare Trust partnered with NOWPDP to provide free disability certificates and special ID cards for individuals with disabilities in Tehsil Burewala. This collaboration aimed to empower people with disabilities by giving them greater access to services, rights, and resources. Through this initiative, 50 individuals from our community received their ID cards, helping them become more recognized within society.

Bashir Begum Hospital offers fully accessible ramps to support patient mobility throughout the facility. Additionally, the Prof. Rana Asghar Ali Khan Academic Block is equipped with five ramps, ensuring complete access to the building, including the auditorium and lawns.

EMERGENCY RELIEF PROGRAM

WHEN DISASTER STRIKES, WE STAND TOGETHER

Emergency Relief is a core component of Rouha Welfare Trust's humanitarian response, ensuring timely support for communities affected by natural disasters, health crises, and other unforeseen emergencies. The initiative focuses on providing essential aid such as food packages, clean drinking water, temporary shelter, clothing, and medical assistance to families in distress.

Relief activities are carried out with rapid mobilization of resources and dedicated volunteers who work on the ground to reach vulnerable populations. In times of floods, earthquakes, or other calamities, emergency relief interventions not only address urgent survival needs but also provide hope and reassurance to those impacted.

Beyond immediate aid, efforts are also directed towards recovery and rehabilitation, enabling affected families to restore normalcy in their lives. This approach reflects a commitment to compassion, solidarity, and responsibility in responding to the urgent needs of communities during times of crisis.

FLOOD IN PAKISTAN 2022

In 2022, prolonged and heavy monsoon rains devastated large parts of Pakistan, claiming more than 1,700 lives. Landslides and flash floods swept away houses, roads, and bridges, leaving many villages cut off from all assistance. The Government of Pakistan declared a state of emergency as over 33 million people were affected. Millions were displaced from their homes, forced to live in temporary shelters with limited access to clean drinking water. With crops destroyed and food supplies severely disrupted, hunger and hardship grew rapidly.

In response, Rouha Welfare Trust extended relief support to more than 300 affected families in Basti Gurwali, District Dera Ismail Khan, KP. The assistance included the distribution of dry rations, tents, bottled water, milk, shoes, clothing, hygiene kits, blankets, and other essential supplies, helping families endure the difficult circumstances.



FLOOD IN PAKISTAN 2010

During the devastating floods of 2010, Rouha Welfare Trust extended voluntary medical assistance and distributed free medicines to affected communities in Kot Addu, Muzaffargarh, Punjab. The medical team, led by Dr. Waseem Athar, worked on the frontlines to provide urgent healthcare to those in need. This relief operation stood as a notable accomplishment, reflecting the Trust's commitment to serving communities in times of crisis.

EARTHQUAKE IN PAKISTAN 2008

In response to the devastating earthquake of 2008 in Muzaffarabad, Azad Kashmir, Rouha Welfare Trust promptly mobilized to support the victims. A medical team from the hospital, led by Dr. Abuzar Saleem, an experienced surgeon, was dispatched to Bagh, Azad Kashmir, equipped with essential medicines and supplies. The team's mission was to deliver timely treatment and compassionate care to vulnerable patients in need, reflecting the Trust's commitment to humanitarian service in times of disaster.



MEDICAL CAMPS

Medical camps are an integral part of Rouha Welfare Trust’s outreach activities, designed to bring quality healthcare services directly to underserved and remote communities. These camps provide free consultations, medicines, and where necessary, referrals to specialized facilities for advanced treatment.

Each camp is staffed by qualified doctors, nurses, and paramedical teams who give their time and expertise. Services often include general medicine, maternal and child health, surgical, ophthalmology, and health awareness sessions on hygiene, nutrition, and preventive care.

In addition to addressing immediate health concerns, medical camps also play a vital role in raising awareness about common illnesses and lifestyle-related conditions. Early detection of diseases such as diabetes, hypertension, and eye disorders helps reduce long-term health risks and financial burdens on families.

Through these initiatives, thousands of beneficiaries have gained access to much-needed healthcare, strengthening community well-being and reinforcing the Trust’s commitment to serving humanity with compassion and dignity.

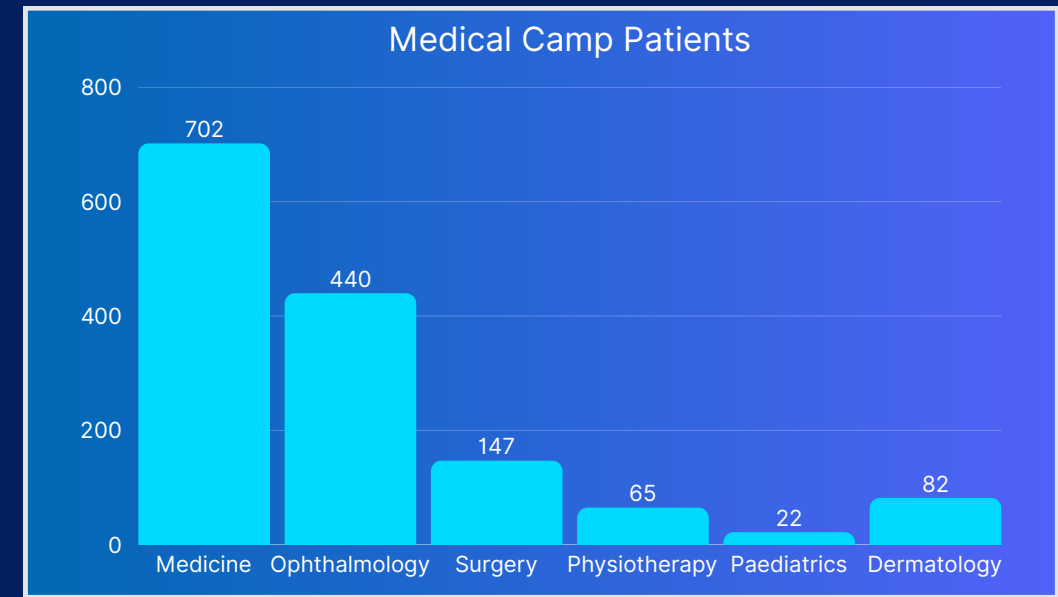

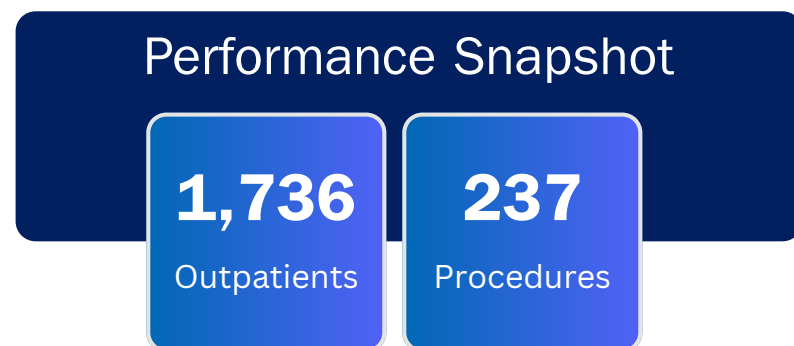

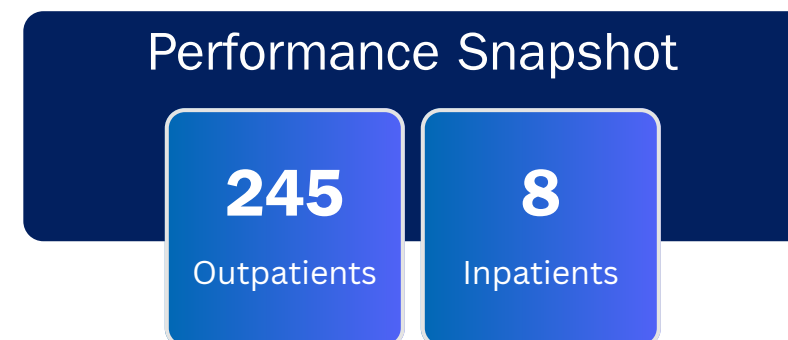

HOSPITAL EXPANSION

With the increasing demand for quality healthcare services, Bashir Begum Hospital has reached its full operational capacity. The existing building, comprising 16 doctors and 10 departments, is now fully occupied, with limited space for further growth. Patient inflow continues to rise, resulting in tight waiting areas, limited private rooms, and constrained space for new medical services and departments.

To meet these growing needs and continue providing accessible, high-quality healthcare to the community, the hospital has initiated an expansion project. The new purpose-built, multistorey building (basement to second floor) is currently under construction.

This expansion marks a vital step toward improving patient comfort, increasing service capacity, and ensuring that Bashir Begum Hospital remains a center of excellence dedicated to compassionate, efficient, and sustainable healthcare delivery.

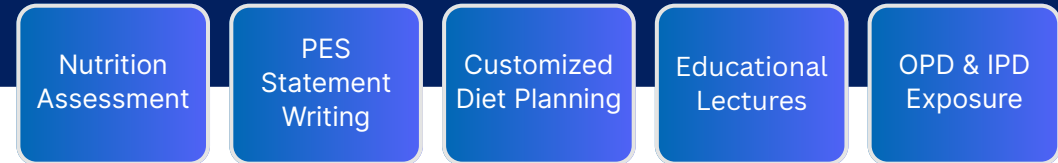

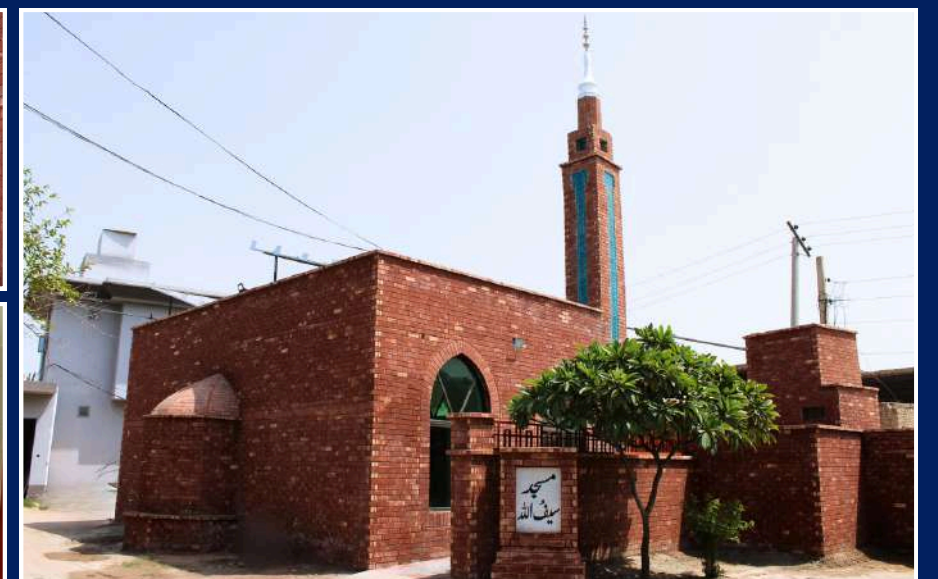
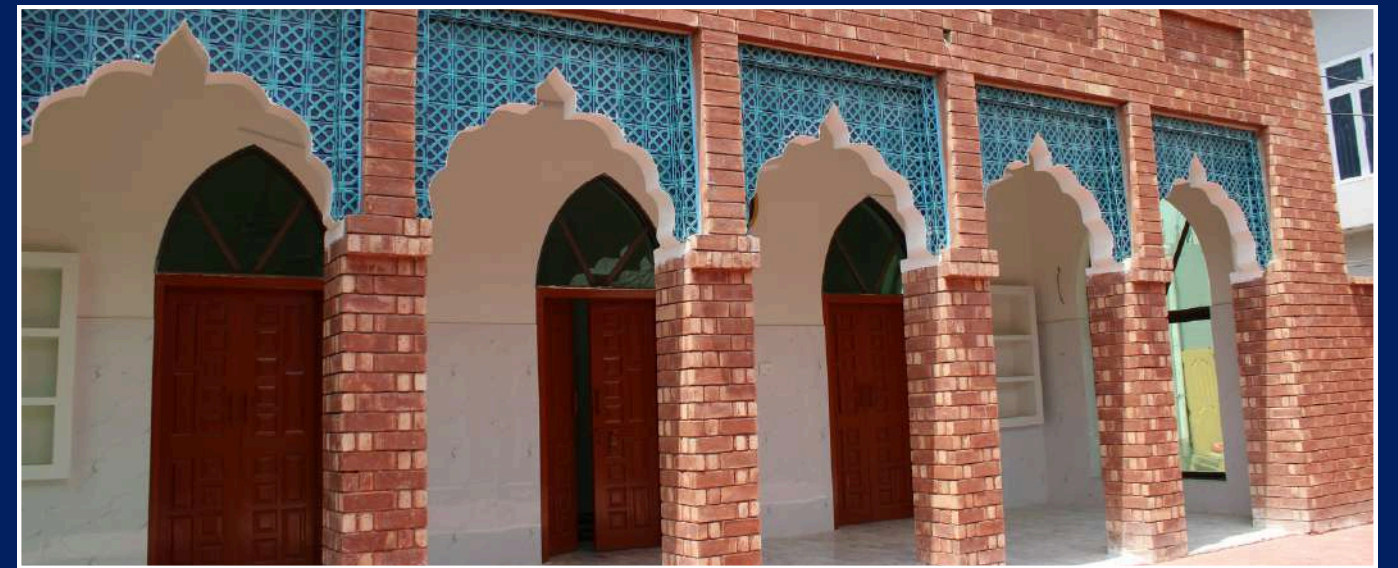

Notes to the Financial Statements
For the year ended June 30, 2025

1. Legal status and operations

Rouha Welfare Trust was registered on September 02, 2021 under the Societies Registration Act, XXI of 1860. The organization is a non-profit, non-governmental and non-political developmental organization which was established in 2003, struggling to aware, organize and help marginalized people in realizing their developmental, civil and other basic human rights. The registered office of the organization is situated at 259 E.B. Main Lahore Road, Burewala.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan. The accounting and reporting standards applicable in Pakistan comprise of:

- Revised Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards for Small Sized Entities (AFRS for SSE) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (ICAP); and
- Accounting Standards for Not for Profit Organizations (Accounting Standard for NPOs) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (ICAP).

3. Significant accounting policies

3.1 Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except as otherwise stated in the respective policies and notes given hereunder.

3.2 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any identified impairment loss, except for capital work in progress which is recognized at cost. Cost includes purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable sales tax and directly attributable costs of bringing the asset to working condition and location. Depreciation on additions is charged from the month in which the asset is available for use while no depreciation is charged in the month of disposal. Depreciation is charged to income currently applying the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of the assets at the rates specified in note 4.1. Depreciation is charged for the full year in which an asset is available for use.

Gain or loss on the disposal of operating fixed assets represented by the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying amounts of the assets is recognized as income or expense during the year in which disposal is made. Maintenance and normal repairs are recognized as expense as and when incurred. Major renewals and improvements are capitalized and the assets so replaced, if any, are retired. Other costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably.

3.3 Revenue

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable on the following basis:

- All donations, fee grants and other income are recognized when realized.
- Interest/mark-up is accounted for on accrual basis.

Whereas other grant received from the donor are recognized as "deferred operational grant" and is transferred to the income and expenditure account to the extent of the expenses incurred by the Organization, in accordance with the terms of grant.measured at cost, which is the fair value of the consideration given. A liability is derecognized when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expired.

3.6 Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents include cash-in-hand, cheques-in-hand and deposits with banks.

3.7 Foreign currency transaction

Currency transactions are recorded at the rate prevailing on the date of transactions and foreign currency deposits are translated into Pak Rupees at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date.
